Grammar: THERE IS / ARE

In English, when you refer to the existence of a thing, you have two possibilities:

1/ Positive statements

a) THERE IS

We use 'there is' for a singular noun or element.



Example: There is a cat (= a cat is there)

b) THERE ARE

We use 'there are' for a noun in plural form.

Example: There are cats (= a number of cats are there)

2/ Negative statements

a) We put 'NOT' after 'is/are'.

b) We usually use the short forms 'there isn't' or 'there aren't'

Example: There isn't a car= there is not a car (= a car is not there)

There aren't people in the street= there aren't people in the street(= people are not in the street)
