### NOBODY'S PERFECT

- Sarah: I can't deny it!
- Wentworth: Nevertheless, there are some students who are lazy but they are cheerful and polite.
- Sarah: Thank you for the compliment.
- Wentworth: You are welcome!

Grammar: indefinites pronouns

In English, you use the indefinite pronouns to refer to:

a) a non-specific person:	Someone/somebody	No one/ nobody	Everyone/everybody	Anyone/Anybody (= n'importe qui)
b) a non-specific thing:	Something	Nothing	Everything	Anything (=n'importe quoi)
