I/ Possessive Adjectives (Les adjectifs possessifs)

In English to refer to possession, you use possessive adjectives:

my
your
his
her
its
our
their

Example: It is my car! It is not your car!!

Sarah has a brother. Her brother lives in Brighton.

They have a son. Their son is very intelligent.

III/ Vocabulary related to dates

In English to refer to a date, you have various possibilities. But you always write with a capital letter the first letter of the day or month. Example: September/ Friday night.

Number One:

You write 05 July or 05/07 in Great Britain, or 07/05 in the US.

But we say **the fifth of July** or **July the fifth**. (In the US, you often use the cardinal number so “July five” is accepted).

Example: Question-Answer

Q: What's the date today? / What day is today?

A: Today is Saturday / It is July 5 / Today is July 5.

Number Two:

In English, when you refer to a date or a specific day of the week , you use the preposition **on**

On Tuesday, I usually go to the gym.

On April 12, my son was born.

Number Three:

In English, when you refer to the month of the year, you use the preposition **in**

In July, people usually go on holiday

I move out **in August**

Number Four:

When you refer to the year, you use the preposition **in**

In 1999, Sarah got married.

In 2025, Moon travel might be frequent.
