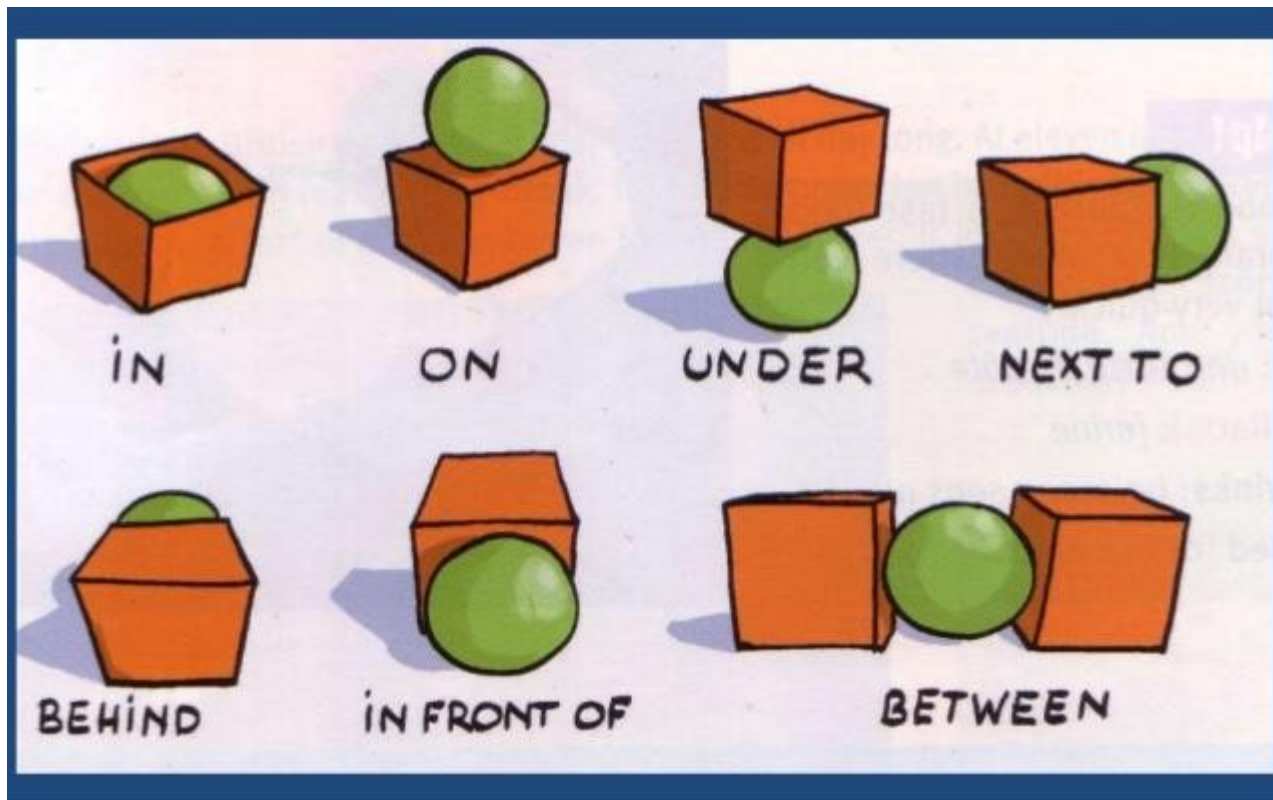

When locating someone, something or a place which is not moving, we use static prepositions.





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Example:



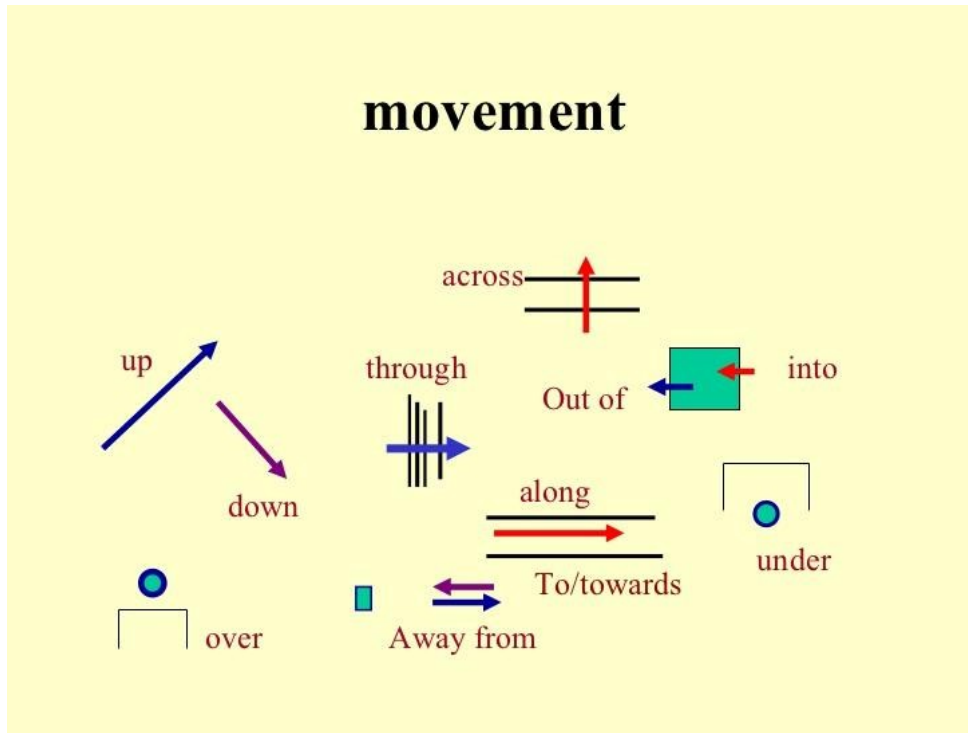
Description of a picture:

The woman is **in** a park. She is **on** a blanket. The blanket is **on** the grass. Her pc is **in front of** her. We can see trees **behind** her. We can see a teacup and its tea **near** her.



2/ DYNAMIC prepositions

When there is a movement we should use dynamic prepositions.



'at' becomes TO /TOWARDS

'around' becomes ROUND

'alongside' becomes ALONG

'in' becomes INTO

'in front of' becomes ACROSS

At the top becomes UP

AT the bottom becomes DOWN



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Example:



They are discussing **round** the table.

They are sitting **down**. Only one woman is standing **up**.

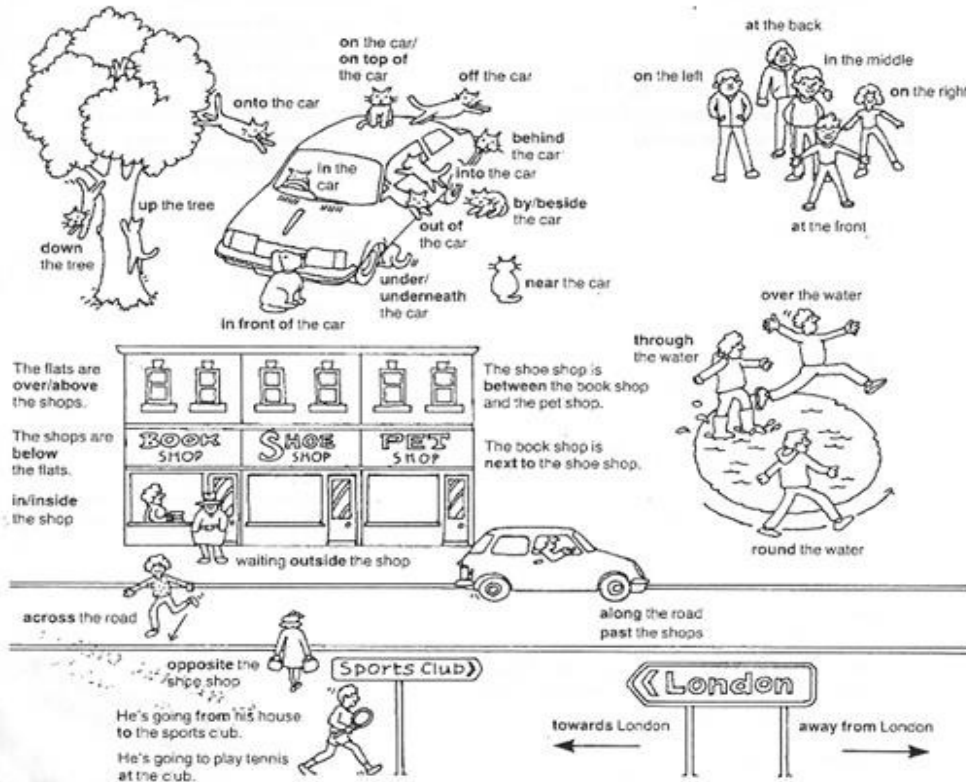
