Dialogue:

Sarah: Wentworth, I heard that animal smuggling has become a fifteen billion dollars-a-year industry worldwide. What do you think about this?

W: I think it's a real shame and human greed is threatening the existence of many species.

Sarah: an estimated 38 million creatures, from butterflies to alligators, panthers and monkeys, are removed from the wild just in Brazil each year. Isn't it awful?

W: definitely. For me the explanation is that with human populations growing, many countries are experiencing habitat destruction and human-wildlife conflict.

Sarah: what makes me sad is so many species are on the brink of extinction, and nobody is reacting.

W: I don't think so. Some animal rights activists are pretty active, and fight against poaching, animal trafficking and smuggling.

Sarah: how can you explain then that the world lost more than 90% of its tiger population in the twentieth century? And what about the whales? Over a thousand of them are killed each year despite a moratorium on commercial whaling! Where are the animal rights activists?

W: Well, they do their best by creating wildlife sanctuaries, by banning ivory trade, and crack down on illegal trading. The problem is they aren't numerous and powerful enough to tip the balance in favour of the animals. Unfortunately, only humans can halt the worst wave of extinction since the dinosaurs died and ensure the survival of many species.
